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President's Report: A Time of Change

As we approach our annual 4th of July Parade and Picnic it seems that our neighborhood and City are challenged by both local and global issues. Hopefully, challenges mean opportunities for us to help build a better City.

Traffic

On the local level we've continued to be challenged by chaotic traffic and confusing mitigation measures. Probably all of us are counting the days until construction on Arroyo Parkway is completed. MHNA has asked the City to put extra resources into traffic control and enforcement to deal with increased traffic and sometimes reckless driving in our neighborhood. You may have noticed increased enforcement measures such as citing drivers who make illegal left turns from Glenarm to Euclid. Mitigation measures on El Molino appear to have resulted in significant reduction in traffic volume, but have added to confusion and inconvenience.

Education

We also recognize an opportunity to influence the direction of public education in our City. Emails to our web site about school choices in our neighborhood are frequent. These emails come from families that are new to Madison Heights or are considering a move to our neighborhood. Our board has voted to support efforts to create a pre-K through 12th grade international baccalaureate campus on the Allendale/Blair site. The plan would reestablish Allendale as an elementary school in the 2009/2010 school year. Initially the school would go from pre-K to the second grade with additional grades added in subsequent years. The Blair Middle School would relocate to the now vacant "C" campus on the corner of Allendale and Marengo.

Our decision to support the IB complex has been based on several factors. First, Blair has made steady progress in terms of academic achievement, responsible student behavior and parent support. The goals of its IB program emphasize both academics and individual responsibility. Second, changes in PUSD have brought top flight personnel to our City. Edwin Diaz, our new Superintendent and his staff have moved quickly to address problems and seek new sources of funding.

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Beautification

A major objective this year is to fund a beautification project that will be a source of pride for our neighborhood. One possibility is to create a mini-amphitheater in the area behind the Allendale Branch Library. The area could be used for reading hour, small classes and community meetings. As a first step, the City will bring in benches to determine the best arrangement for the enclosed area. A project plan would feature an awning arrange to provide shade.

Global Issues

Our City, under its Green Pasadena initiatives, seeks to be a leader in civic solutions for the global energy and warming crises. All of us need to be informed of conservation opportunities. As a responsible neighborhood association we must be active in this area and support the City's initiatives.

Our Mission

When we became a tax exempt organization, we committed not just to work for the betterment of our neighborhood, but to contribute to the betterment of the entire City. Our major focus remains our neighborhood, but we also will seek to be leaders in helping to Pasadena be a better city.

Our City is a leader in the "greening' of Southern California. It is important that our neighborhood support the City's efforts. In the words of Mayor Bill Bogaard, "Pasadena is committed to achieving sustainability in its policies and operations ... we join with many international cities in offering leadership and a lesson on global warming. The City recognizes that the successful implementation of its Green City Action Plan depends on the involvement and support of the community. Charting this course for a sustainable future requires the participation of all sectors of the community.

We seek the help of our high school juniors and seniors to prepare a position statement and plan for our neighborhood's "green" efforts. This is an ideal opportunity for our students to earn community service credits and play an important role in civic leadership.

Our student volunteers will work with City organizations, educational institutions and providers of energy and water saving systems to learn about initiatives and solutions. They will survey our residents to determine the issues that are considered to be of greatest importance for our neighborhood. The volunteer team will present its findings and recommendations at our annual meeting.

Our Neighborhood Association is committed to help make Pasadena a better city. Our strong effort to support a Green Pasadena will set an example for other neighborhood associations.




Society, he has been involved with student government, the yearbook and a cross age tutorial program that assists ninth graders. Justin will attend University of California San Diego in the fall.
